Laid, Placed, and Arranged

COLLEGE PARK, Md. – From September 6-December 8, 2017, the University of Maryland Art Gallery presents *Laid, Placed, and Arranged*, an exhibition that explores recent work made by six University of Maryland MFA alumni — **Laurel Farrin, Hiroyuki Hamada, Francie Hester, Meg Mitchell, Ellington Robinson, and Wilfredo Valladares** — who attended University of Maryland, College Park from 1990 to 2010, and have gone on to become significant voices in the realm of contemporary art and academia.

The exhibition's theme is derived from Michel Foucault's influential text *The Order of Things*. In it he [Foucault] references the act of linking seemingly unrelated objects "in which a large number of possible orders glittered separately, in the lawless and uncharted dimension of the heterocline. [...]; in such a state, things are 'laid,' 'placed,' and 'arranged' in sites so very different from one another that it is impossible to find a common place beneath them all."

"All of the artists come from vastly diverse geographies, experiences, and disciplines," says University of Maryland Art Gallery assistant director and exhibition curator Taras W. Matla. "Yet, the work they produce transcends these differences. It converges with a common purpose: to further the understanding of one another and to make better sense of the world in which we live."

The exhibition is organized by University of Maryland Art Gallery, in collaboration with the Department of Art. Financial support provided by the Dorothy and Nicholas Orem Exhibition Fund and a generous grant from the Maryland State Arts Council.

An opening reception for *Laid, Placed, and Arranged* will be held on Wednesday, September 6, from 5 p.m. to 7 p.m. at the University of Maryland Art Gallery, 2202 Parren J.
